Learning outcomes of the course unit:

Upon completion of the course **students** would be able to explain fundamental political terms like globalization, global ethics and global risk; they would be able to apply their understandings of the above terms to issues of cultural diversity, social justice and political risk, and global ethical accountability. They **develop** skills of reflective arguments on the wider ramifications of globalization and diversity. They are be **able** to appraise and utilize their knowledge of globalization, drawing on new theoretical ideas from international relations, political science, sociology and related fields, to critically evaluate examples of racism, disadvantage and intolerance as well as positive traits of cultural coexistence that associate with the phenomenon of globalization.

- 6. The Global Economic System (Actors and Global Division of Labor and Power)
- 7. The Global Culture (New Global Culture, Actors and Issues)
- 8. Globalization and Governance: Transnational State, Transnational Institutions
- 9. Resistance to Globalization (Environment and other Issues)
- 10. Theories of Globalization (Neoliberalism, Hegemonic stability theory)

- 11. Victimization and Empowerment (Actors and Methods)
- 12. Globalization: Identity, Culture, and conflict
- 13. Globalization: Advantages and disadvantages
